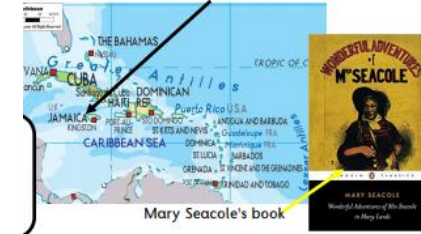

Key vocabulary

Crimean War	(1853-1856) A war between Russia on one side and Britain, France, the Ottoman Empire (now Türkiye) and Sardinia on the other.	hospital	A building where doctors and nurses take care of people who are ill or injured.
battlefield	A place where soldiers fight in war.	nurse	Somebody who takes care of people who are sick or injured.
First World War	(1914-1918) First World War or World War I.	patients	People who are being looked after by nurses and doctors.
Hero	Somebody who has done something worthy of praise and recognition	soldier	A person who is trained to fight in wars.

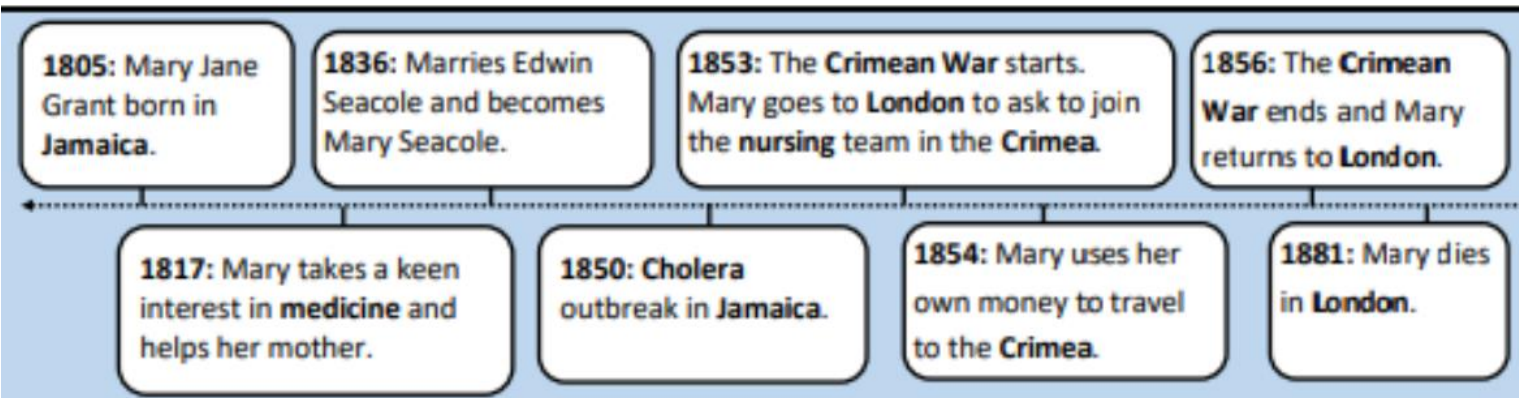
Who was Mary Seacole?

Mary Seacole was born in Jamaica



Mary Seacole was a nurse. Her mother was Jamaican and her father was Scottish. She travelled from Jamaica to look after wounded soldiers on the battlefield in the Crimean War. She set up a hospital called the British Hotel to look after soldiers.

Mary Seacole's and Florence Nightingale's life on a timeline



Who was Florence Nightingale?



Florence Nightingale was a nurse. She made hospitals cleaner for patients and looked after soldiers in the Crimean War. She set up the Nightingale Training School for nurses in 1860. She was often known as the 'lady with the lamp'.

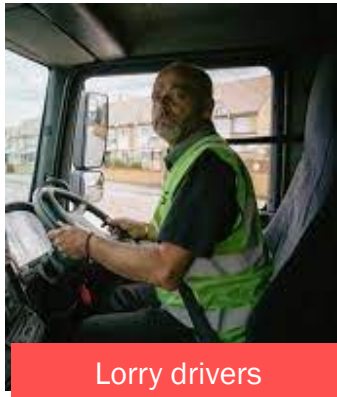

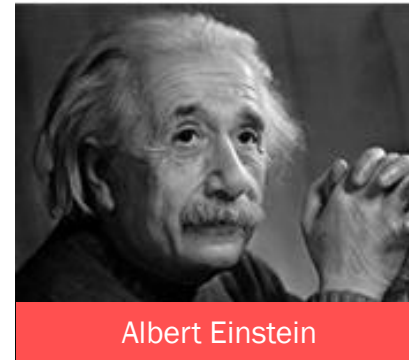

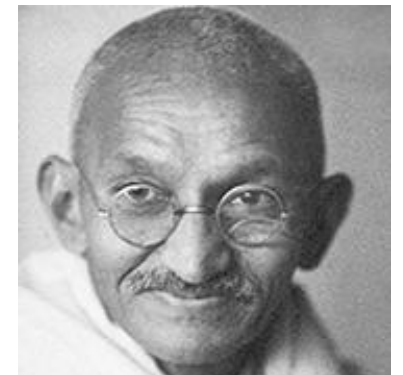
